

Hot Topics

- Doc fix enacted:
 - Extends CHIP funding with 23 percentagepoint increase (through FY 2017)
 - Extends related programs through FY 2017
 - Permanently extends QI and TMA; other
 ACA-related programs extended through FY
 2017
- Delays DSH reductions until FY 2018
- Reauthorizes Secure Rural Schools (FYs 2014-2015)




Hot Topics, continued

- Surface transportation programs expire at end of May, but HTF is expected to remain solvent into summer
- Debt limit was reinstated in March.
 Bipartisan Policy Center estimates a day of reckoning in the final calendar quarter of 2015
- ESEA likely to move
